# LUDMILA NAVARRO

Fine artist and jewelry designer Ludmila Navarro creates an unconventional, upcycling line of jewelry, encapsulating an international and empowering spirit. Individually handmade by Ludmila herself, the collection consists of statement rings, necklaces, bracelets and brooches. The eye catching and dynamic pieces, often featuring nature, skulls and animals, are "A tribute to all those women who know what they want."

SW: How did you transition into designing jewelry from fine art? Did you always want to be a jewelry designer?

LM: I did not want to be a jewelry designer, but I used to wear a lot of jewels and accessories and, usually, it was quite difficult to find the right ones. The emotion was in a very natural way. In fact, I think it was an evolution in my career. I always felt a strong desire to explore non-dimensional supports with different volumes and, as you know, all is susceptible to being arbitrarily manipulated. At the same time, fashion jewelry interested me always and I wanted to give it an artistic approach and to overlap the right lines of the world of art. I started to create, first, jewelry for me because it did not exist.

SW: Define your Jewelry.

LM: This is quite complicated. Of course, first, it is a clearly accessible jewelry. I think that it's made of working with different colors, materials, shapes, surfaces, compositions, etc., during a lot of time, and finally applying all the achievements and a lot of drama in a jewel. Otherwise, I believe in sustainable and eco-work. For that reason, I usually work with vintage jewels and elements and I practice up-cycling, of course.

SW: Where are you from? Tell us a bit about your upbringing.

LM: I am from Zaragoza, north of Spain, where I grew up. I actually lived between Saragossa and Barcelona, where I studied History of Art and Fine Arts. I painted for a long time and I also worked as a fashion illustrator for a very well-known French fashion magazine before starting with jewelry design.

SW: Where do you draw your inspirations and your passion?

LM: First, since I was a girl, my parents' home art was very present daily. That's why I usually said that art was like a friend for me; it always accompanied me. Then, in school, and finally at university, my curiosity and sensitivity brought me to jewelry design. In fact, it was a quite long process. I also worked as a fashion illustrator for a fashion magazine for more than ten years. It was, definitely, a point of influence.

SW: Your jewelry has international visitors. Which locations in our world have been your strongest influences?

LM: Thank God I travel very often and I have been almost everywhere. I love cultures and societies. For me, they are a great source of inspiration. I try to do a mix among all of them. In fact, I live in two cultures; I do not think I have a stronger influence, but if I had to choose one it would probably be Asia. Such a cultural culture...



**JW:** What materials do you use in your jewelry and where do they come from?

**DN:** I normally use quartz and stones of a very high quality to cover the structure of the piece, which is always gold plated. Then I work with vintage elements and jewels that I find everywhere I go: auctions, antiques, markets, second-hand markets, flea markets, online shopping, etc. I try to get unique elements with such value as an antique or rare piece. I do heavy up-cycling. What it means is that I transform vintage jewels into new jewels of a better quality by means of an artistic process.

**JW:** Your personal style is very distinctive and unique, how would you define your style?

**DN:** Very complicated, also. Normally, it is something that I feel is pure intuition. Usually, I do not think about my own style. I just try to be and to feel free. We can just say my style is to show my creativity, as I suddenly think about the idea of 'designer'. It is very inspiring for me. Right now, I think that to create one own style requires a permanent creation. I want to create a composition for jewelry that I can say is my personal style and it's far from ordinary fashion and is close to my feelings. It is a style made with soul.

**JW:** You have said your jewels "are a tribute to those women who know what they want, who are addictive, free, powerful and unique." Do you believe that jewelry can empower a woman?

**DN:** Of course, *Totally! Definitely!* That is the history of the accessories. Let's think about the Tribes, the crowns of Kings and Queens... I mean, Very often, this ring makes me happy, makes me feel beautiful, makes me feel strong, makes me feel safe, etc. Anyway, my intention is just to provide a kind of statement. All those women, all of us, we are power and uniqueness and when wearing one of my pieces, I just want them to be in contact with their inner power and to remember how wonderful that they are.

**JW:** It appears that you tell a story in the pieces you create, is that so? Does each piece have a meaning?

**DN:** For you yes, because you see the finished work. In fact, each finished jewel is like a story by itself. For me, it's a *Process*. I discover the meaning during the process, meanwhile, I create the piece. When the jewel is in progress, for me, it's like a game where trying, playing, testing, and everything can be possible. I just try to create a dialogue among the different elements that I use in the piece.

**JW:** Do you personalize any designs for your clients?

**DN:** *Really*, and now it's happening increasingly more. Since I have a creative mind from all around the world of vintage elements, usually some clients ask me about a subject and I propose many projects or some elements being no their own vintage jewel or materials. During the last two years I made many very unconventional engagement rings as well.



**SW:** What is a typical day for you?

**LM:** I am an early bird! I wake up very early from 6:30 pm till the night, overall, for working and I usually do a lot of things. I am a workaholic. I usually spend lots of time at my studio where I do all of my jewelry and I go to my studio daily where I work with my favorite jeweler. I am also involved in terms of social media and communication of my brand "Lestelle - Unconventional Jewelry". I like to sport and yoga and nice date for my family, my little daughter and my husband, of course.

**SW:** What are your hobbies?

**LM:** Not at all, I love to travel. Then, I love to read, dance, listen to music. I am a real music lover and I always listen to music whilst I work. Music inspires me a lot. I also love gardening. I am very lucky to have a big garden at home! I love flowers, so you may have understood looking my jewelry.

**SW:** Who do you admire?

**LM:** I am not a neophyte since I really admire many creative people, from my peers which is independent with their own criticism and which pushes originality and does not care about what is politically correct. I also admire all those women, from any culture or place, in love with themselves naturally. I also admire my mother, of course.

**SW:** Where was the last place you traveled to?

**LM:** Two weeks ago I was in Lisbon. A very charming city quite unique and very inspiring.

**SW:** Who are a few of your favorite designers?

**LM:** Fashion Designers: Alexander McQueen, Miuccia Prada, Jean Paul Gaultier, Alessandro Michele, Dries van Noten, Vivienne Westwood, Rei Kawakubo, Issey Miyake. Sometimes they are very different, but I love opposites and I love to mix them also.

Industrial Designers: Philippe Starck and Andris Puraus. Jewelry Designers: Aspasia NY and Ericson Deacon.

**SW:** If you could only wear one piece of jewelry for the rest of your life, which one would it be?

**LM:** A white skull ring which I wear constantly. Each time I see it I remember how beautiful life is. I like to wear it on the same hand with another ring to produce a big contrast.
